**AMENDED COMPLAINT FOR
PATENT INFRINGEMENT**
DEMAND FOR JURY TRIAL

21 COMES NOW, Plaintiff EVERYMD LLC (“Plaintiff” or “EveryMD”), and on
22 information and belief alleges as follows:

23 **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

24 1. This is an action for patent infringement under 35 U.S.C. §§ 271 et. seq.
25 and 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331 and 1338(a).

26 2. The acts of patent infringement alleged herein occurred within this
27 judicial district, Plaintiff resides in this district, and Defendant FACEBOOK, INC.
28

1 (“Defendant” or “Facebook”) is subject to personal jurisdiction in this district.
2 Therefore, venue is proper pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1391(b), (c), and 1400(b).
3

4 **PARTIES**

5 3. Plaintiff is a California Limited Liability Company with a place of
6 business at 2032 Whitley Ave., Los Angeles, CA 90068.

7 4. Defendant is a Delaware Corporation with a place of business at 1601
8 Willow Road, Menlo Park, CA 94025.

9 5. Defendant’s current market value is a multiple of defendant’s annual
10 earnings.
11

12 6. Defendant’s current market value is over 200 (two hundred) times its
13 annual earnings.

14 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**
15 **PATENT INFRINGEMENT**

16 7. Plaintiff incorporates by reference paragraphs 1–6 as though fully set
17 forth herein.

18 8. Plaintiff operates the website www.everymd.com.

19 9. Plaintiff’s website at www.everymd.com has since the year 2000
20 provided email messaging services allowing patients to communicate with over
21 300,000 doctors.
22

23 10. Plaintiff’s principals Frank Weyer and Troy Javaher (collectively, “the
24 EveryMD inventors”) invented numerous novel technologies and inventions during
25 development of the www.everymd.com website.

26 11. On November 23, 1999, the EveryMD inventors filed U.S. Patent
27 Application Serial No. 09/447,755 entitled “Method Apparatus and Business System
28 for Online Communications with Online and Offline Recipients” disclosing the

1 inventions made by the EveryMD inventors while developing the www.everymd.com
2 website.

3
4 12. To date, four separate patents covering four separate inventions have
5 issued from the patent application originally filed in November 1999. Those patents
6 are U.S. Patent Nos. 6,671,714 (issued December 30, 2003), 7,644,122 (issued
7 January 5, 2010), 8,499,047 (issued July 30, 2013), and 8,504,631 (issued August 6,
8 2013).

9 13. Plaintiff is the assignee of record of U.S. Patent No. 8,499,047 entitled
10 “Method, Apparatus and Business System for Online Communications with Online
11 and Offline Recipients” (“the ‘047 patent”).

12 14. The ‘047 patent is valid and in full force and effect.

13
14 15. The ‘047 patent is directed to a novel method for providing email
15 communications by a computer system.

16 16. Defendant directly infringes the ‘047 patent by practicing the claimed
17 invention of the ‘047 patent without authorization of Plaintiff.

18 17. One example of how Defendant directly infringes claims 1-3 and 5-6 of
19 the ‘047 patent is set forth in paragraphs 18 to 43 below.

20 18. The preamble of claim 1 of the ‘047 patent states:

21 “1. *A method for providing e-mail communications between a sender and a*
22 *recipient by a first computer system comprising the steps of:*”

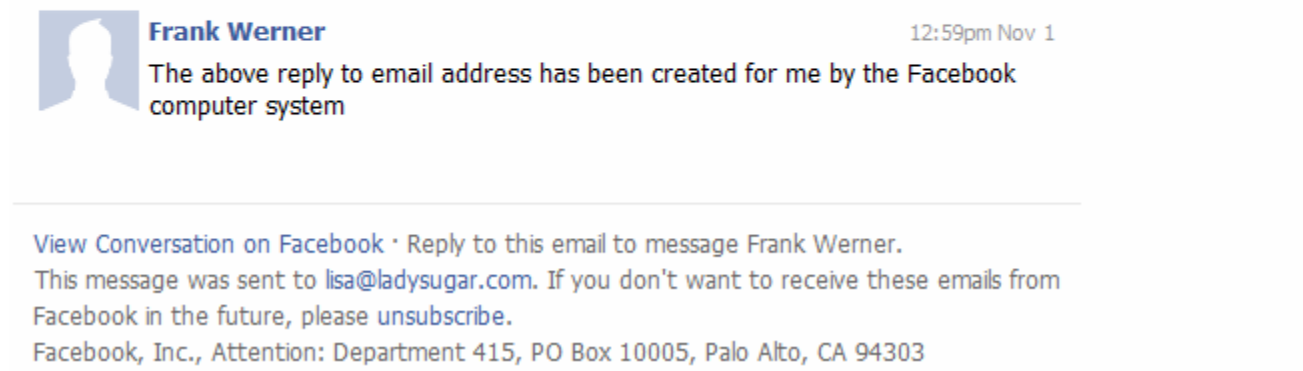
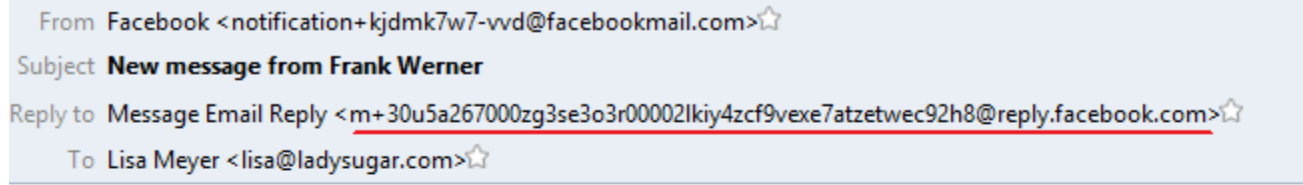
24 19. Facebook’s computer system provides e-mail communications between
25 Facebook members.

26 20. The limitation of claim 1 that follows the preamble of claim 1 of the ‘047
27 patent states:
28

1 “said first computer system creating a first created e-mail address for a
2 recipient”.

3
4 21. When a first Facebook member sends a message from the Facebook
5 website to a second Facebook member, the Facebook computer system creates an e-
6 mail address at which the Facebook member can receive a reply message. That
7 created reply-to email address is an example of the claimed *first created e-mail*
8 *address for a recipient*, where the *recipient* is the first Facebook member.

9 22. The example screenshot below shows an e-mail message sent from a first
10 Facebook member Frank Werner to a second Facebook member Lisa Meyer. The e-
11 mail message includes the *first created e-mail address*
12 m+30u5a267000zg3se3o3r00002lkiy4zcf9vexe7atzetwec92h8@reply.facebook.com
13 that the Facebook computer system created for *recipient* Frank Werner.

18 23. The next limitation of claim 1 of the ‘047 patent states:
19
20 “said first computer system receiving an incoming first e-mail message from a
21 sending entity other than said first computer system comprising a first existing e-mail
22 address of a sender addressed to said first created e-mail address of said recipient”.

24. When a second Facebook member replies to an e-mail message from a first Facebook member that contains a *first created e-mail address*, the e-mail sent by the second member (1) is received by the Facebook computer system, (2) is addressed to the first created email address, (3) is sent from the second member's email server (not the Facebook computer system), and (4) contains the existing email address of the (sending) second Facebook member.

25. The example screenshot below shows an *incoming first e-mail message* in the form it was sent by Facebook member Lisa Meyer and received by the Facebook computer system as a reply to the e-mail message depicted in paragraph 22 above. The e-mail message was sent from Lisa Meyer's SMTP mail server, which is a *sending entity other than the first (Facebook) computer system*. It is addressed to the *first created email address*

1 26. The next limitation of claim 1 of the '047 patent states:
2

3 *“said first computer system creating a second created e-mail address for said*
4 *sender different from said first existing e-mail address and from said first created e-*
5 *mail address; said first computer system creating a first modified e-mail message by*
6 *replacing said first existing e-mail address in said incoming first e-mail message with*
7 *said second created e-mail address; said first computer system delivering said first*
8 *modified e-mail message to said recipient”.*

9 27. After the Facebook computer system receives an email message
10 addressed to the *first created e-mail address* from a *first existing e-mail address*,
11 before forwarding it to the recipient, the Facebook computer system creates a *second*
12 *created e-mail address* for the *sender* different from the *first created e-mail address*
13 and modifies the received e-mail message by replacing the sender's *first existing e-*
14 *mail address* with the *second created e-mail address*.

15 28. The screenshot below that shows the e-mail depicted in paragraph 25
16 above after it has been delivered by the Facebook computer system to the *recipient*,
17 Facebook member Frank Werner. In the screenshot below, the sender's *first existing*
18 *email address* lisa@ladysugar.com has been replaced by the Facebook computer
19 system with the *second created email address*
20 m+3092847x000zg3qug53y00002lkj0fzcqlcgde3cd1rsltmq2h8@reply.facebook.com,
21 which is different from the *first created email address*
22 m+30u5a267000zg3se3o3r00002lkiy4zcf9vexe7atzetwec92h8@reply.facebook.com.

16 “wherein said step of said first computer system delivering said first modified e-
17 mail message to said recipient comprises said first computer system sending said first
18 modified e-mail message to a second existing e-mail address of said recipient different
19 from said first created e-mail address of said recipient.”

20 30. In delivering the *first modified e-mail message* to the recipient, the
21 Facebook computer system sends the *first modified e-mail message* to a *second*
22 *existing email address* of the recipient that is different from the *first created e-mail*
23 *address of said recipient*.

24 31. The screenshot below shows the *first modified e-mail message* depicted
25 in paragraph 28 above as actually received by the recipient Frank Werner. As shown
26 in the screenshot, the Facebook computer system sent the *first modified e-mail*
27 *message* to the *second existing e-mail address of said recipient*, frank@ccofoe.com,
28

1 which is different from the *first created email address of said recipient*,

22 reply e-mail message is received by Facebook’s computer system. This *second*
23 *incoming e-mail message* comprises the recipient’s *second existing e-mail address* and
24 is addressed to the *second created e-mail address*.

25 34. The screenshot below shows a *second incoming e-mail message* sent by
26 *recipient* Frank Werner and received by the Facebook computer system. It includes
27 the *second existing e-mail address* frank@ccofo.com and is addressed to the *second*
28

25 36. Upon receiving a *second incoming e-mail message*, the Facebook

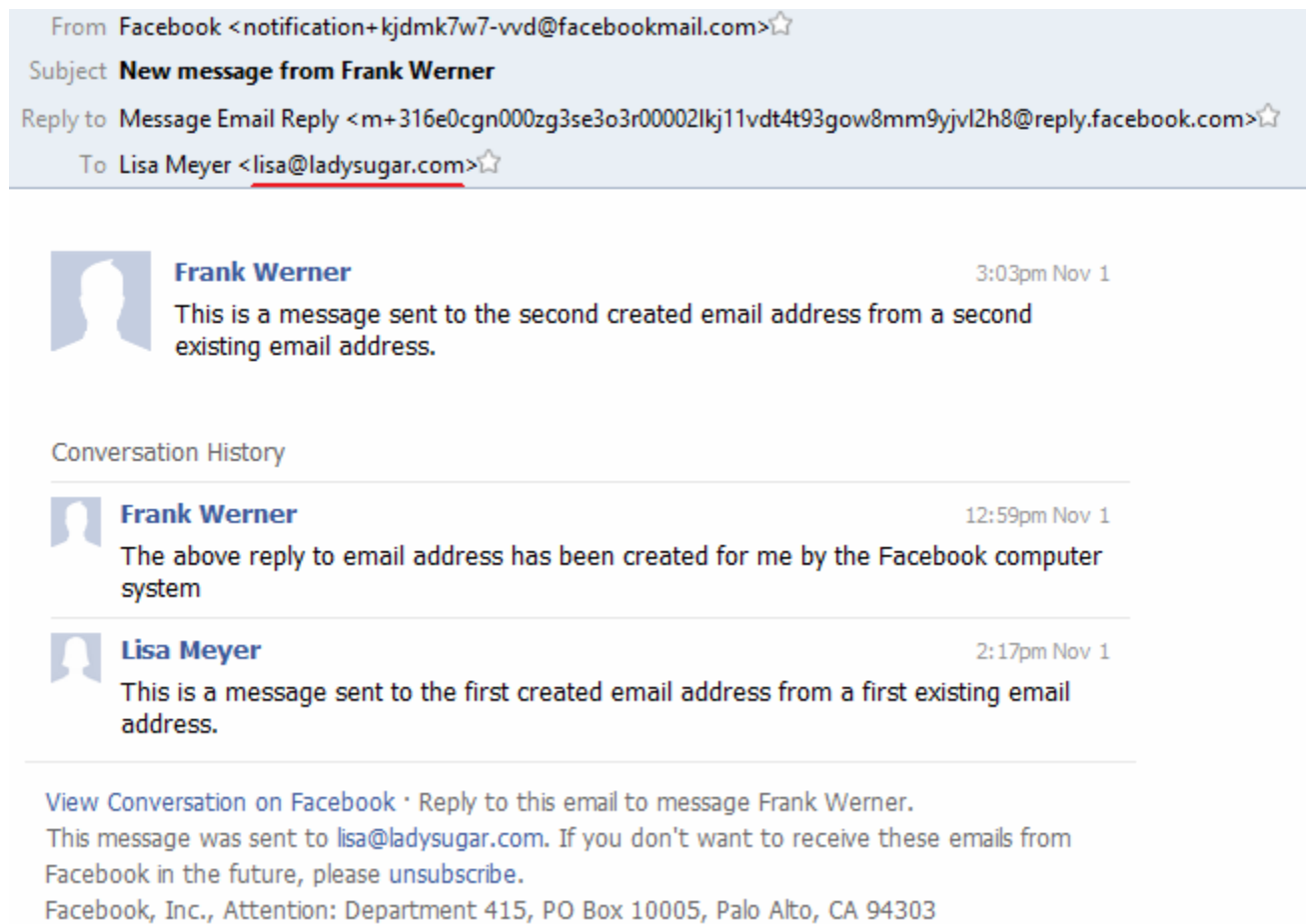
26 computer creates a *second modified e-mail message* by replacing the *second created e-*

As shown in the screenshot, the Facebook computer system replaced created a *second modified e-mail message* by replacing the *second created e-mail address* m+3092847x000zg3qug53y00002lkj0fzcqlcgde3cd1rslmq2h8@reply.facebook.com shown in the screenshot in paragraph 34 above with *the first existing e-mail address* lisa@ladysugar.com.

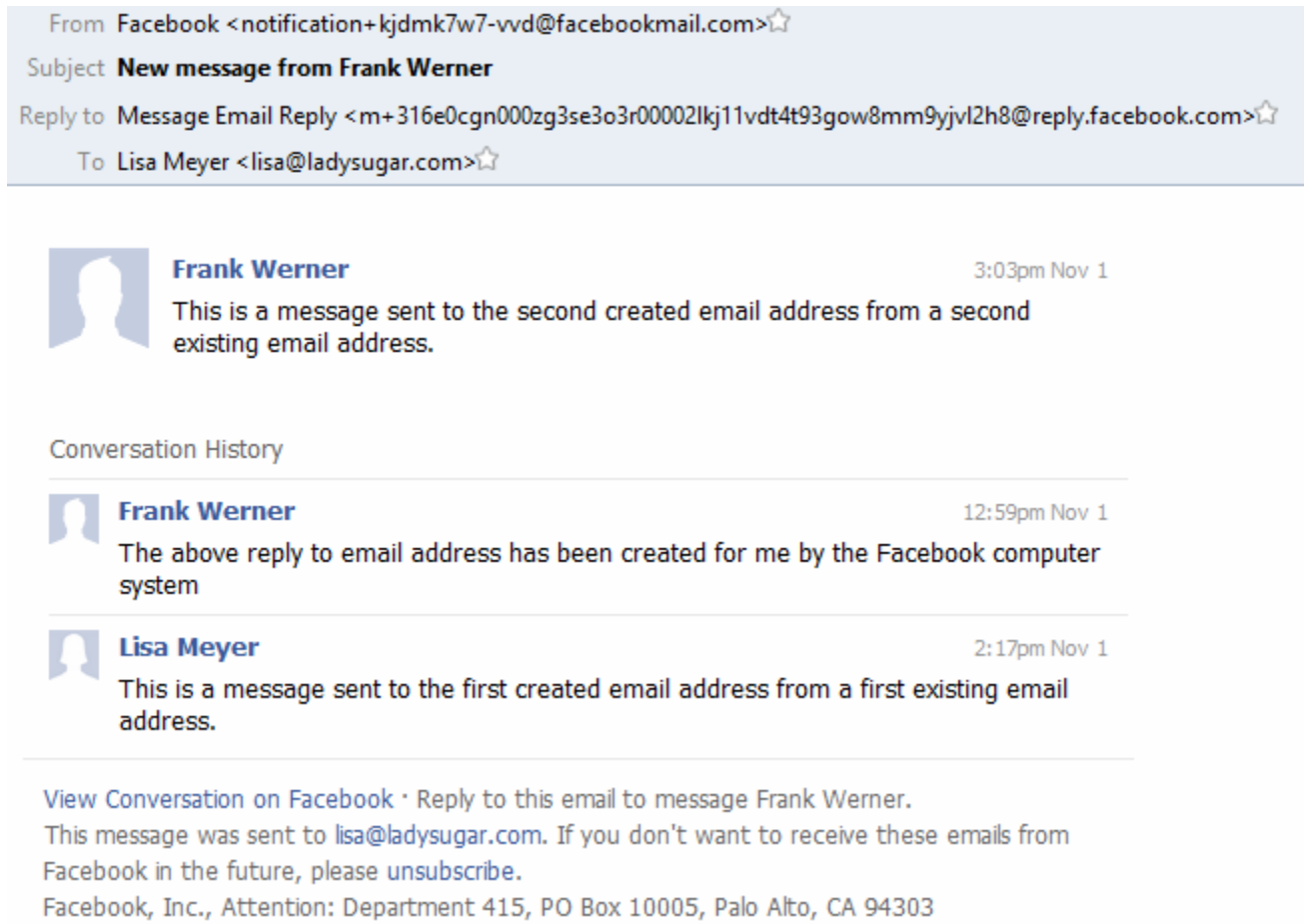


38. Claim 5 of the '047 patent states:

2 39. Facebook’s computer delivers the *second modified e-mail message* to
3 *said sender*, for whom Facebook’s computer system created the *second created e-mail*
4 *address.*”

6 paragraph 37 above as actually received by Facebook member Lisa Meyer.




22 41. Claim 6 of the ‘047 patent states:

23 “6. *The method of claim 5 wherein said step of said first computer system*
24 *delivering said second modified e-mail message to said recipient comprises said first*
25 *computer system sending said second modified e-mail message to said first existing e-*
26 *mail address.*”


27 42. Facebook’s computer delivers the *second modified e-mail message* by
28 sending it to the *first existing e-mail address*.

23 44. Plaintiff has provided constructive notice of the '047 patent by marking
24 the www.everymd.com website with the '047 patent number at least as early as
25 August 18, 2013.

26 45. The lead attorney for Defendant in this action is Heidi Keefe.

27 46. Heidi Keefe is an experienced and responsible attorney.

28 47. Heidi Keefe is the lead attorney for Defendant in Civil Action No. CV-
10-00499 MRP (FFMx) that involves U.S. Patent No. 7,644,122 ("the '122 patent),
which is the parent of the '047 patent.

1 48. Heidi Keefe is the lead attorney in U.S. Patent Office Reexamination
2 Control No. 95/001411 in which Defendant has sought reexamination of the ‘122
3 patent.
4

5 49. As Defendant’s lead attorney in the District Court action and
6 reexamination involving the ‘122 patent, Heidi Keefe has a duty to Defendant to stay
7 informed about the status of the ‘122 patent and any related patent applications,
8 including the patent application that issued as the ‘047 patent.

9 50. The prosecution history of the ‘047 patent has been public since it was
10 published on March 11, 2010.

11 51. On information and belief, as a responsible attorney, Heidi Keefe kept
12 Defendant apprised of the status of the patent application for the ‘047 patent.

13 52. On information and belief, as a responsible attorney, Heidi Keefe was
14 aware of the claims of the ‘047 patent that were allowed on June 21, 2013.

15 53. On information and belief, as a responsible attorney, Heidi Keefe
16 informed Defendant of the issuance and claims of the ‘047 patent before the complaint
17 in this action was filed.
18

19 54. Defendant had constructive and, on information and belief, actual notice
20 of Plaintiff’s patent rights prior to August 22, 2013, but Defendant willfully infringed
21 and continues to willfully infringe Plaintiff’s patent rights.

22 55. Defendant’s infringements of Plaintiff’s patent rights have irreparably
23 damaged Plaintiff and will continue to cause irreparable harm unless enjoined by the
24 Court.

DEMAND FOR RELIEF

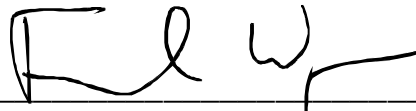
WHEREFORE, Plaintiff asks this Court to:

- e. Award Plaintiff interest and costs; and
- f. Award Plaintiff such other and further relief as is just and proper.

DEMAND FOR JURY TRIAL

Plaintiff hereby demands a trial by jury of all issues so triable.
