**Complaint for Patent Infringement**

Plaintiff, Sampo IP, LLC (“Sampo”) alleges the following for its complaint of patent infringement against Intuit, Inc. (“Intuit” or “Defendant”).

**Nature of the Action**

This is an action for patent infringement of United States Patent No. 6,161,149 (the “’149 Patent”), United States Patent No. 6,772,229 (the “’229 Patent”), and United States Patent No. 8,015,495 (the “’495 Patent”) (collectively, the “Patents-in-Suit”) under the Patent Laws of the United States, 35 U.S.C. § 1, et seq., and seeking damages and injunctive and other relief under 35 U.S.C. § 281, et seq.

**The Parties**

1. Plaintiff Sampo is a Virginia limited liability company with its principal place of business at 2331 Mill Road, Suite 100, Alexandria, Virginia 22314.
2. On information and belief, Intuit, Inc. is a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Delaware, with its principal place of business at 2700 Coast

Avenue, Mountain View, California 94043. Intuit has appointed The Prentice-Hall Corporation System, Inc., 2711 Centerville Road, Suite 400, Wilmington, Delaware 19808 as its agent for service of process.

### **Jurisdiction and Venue**

3. This is an action for patent infringement arising under the Patent Laws of the United States, Title 35 of the United States Code.

4. This Court has subject matter jurisdiction over this action pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331 and 1338(a) because the action concerns the infringement of United States patents.

5. Venue is proper in this judicial district pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1391 and 1400(b) because, among other reasons, Intuit has transacted business in the State of Delaware and Intuit has committed and continue to commit acts of patent infringement in Delaware.

6. Upon information and belief, this Court has personal jurisdiction over Defendant because it is a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Delaware and has purposely availed itself of the privileges and benefits of the laws of the State of Delaware, and because it transacts substantial business in the State of Delaware, directly or through intermediaries, including: (i) at least a portion of the infringements alleged herein, and (ii) regularly doing or soliciting business in Delaware, engaging in other persistent courses of conduct, maintaining continuous and systematic contacts in Delaware, purposefully availing itself of the privileges of doing business in Delaware, and/or deriving substantial revenue from goods and services provided to individuals in Delaware.

### **The Patents-In-Suit**

7. Sampo is the owner by assignment of the '149 Patent, entitled "Centrifugal Communication and Collaboration Method," which the United States Patent & Trademark Office

duly issued on December 12, 2000. A true and correct copy of the '149 Patent is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

8. Sampo is the owner by assignment of the '229 Patent, entitled "Centrifugal Communication and Collaboration Method," which the United States Patent & Trademark Office duly issued on August 3, 2004. A true and correct copy of the '229 Patent is attached hereto as Exhibit B.

9. Sampo is the owner by assignment of the '495 Patent, entitled "Centrifugal Communication and Collaboration Method," which the United States Patent & Trademark Office duly issued on September 6, 2011. A true and correct copy of the '495 Patent is attached hereto as Exhibit C.

### **Factual Background**

10. The inventions of the Patents-in-Suit are applicable to, among other things, transmitting, receiving and distributing information among peripheral computing devices using a central agent. The central agent selectively pushes notices to peripheral devices, allowing peripheral devices to access certain information. The inventions facilitate asynchronous collaboration among participants, and allow certain participants to receive certain information while preventing other participants from receiving the information.

11. For example, and without limitation, the inventions of the Patents-in-Suit are applicable to a central agent that receives information from and transmits information to peripheral computing devices of members of a group. The central agent receives information from a computing device of a first member of a group, the information indicating to which other members certain information is relevant. The central agent then sends a notice to only the selected members, and allows access to information to only those selected members. Similarly,

the central agent may receive additional information from another member of the group, the information indicating to which other members certain information is relevant. The central agent then sends a notice only to the selected members, and allows access to information to only those selected members.

12. For another example, without limitation, the inventions of the Patents-in-Suit are applicable to a central agent that receives information from and transmits information to peripheral computing devices of participants in a distributed application. The central agent receives information from a computing device of a first participant, the information indicating to which other participants certain information is relevant. The central agent then sends a notice to only the selected participants, and allows access to information to only those selected participants. Similarly, the central agent may receive additional information from another participant, the information indicating to which other participants certain information is relevant. The central agent then sends a notice to only the selected participants, and allows access to information to only those selected participants.

### **Intuit's Infringing Products and Methods**

13. Intuit purports to be a “leading provider of innovative business and financial management solutions for small business, consumers and accounting professionals.”<sup>1</sup> Intuit purports that it has “adapted [its] product line, moving from the desktop to the Internet and mobile devices. By offering many services online, [it is] connecting customers to [its] solutions and with each other in ways that add more value to [its] products and services.”<sup>2</sup>

14. In order to generate additional revenues, Intuit provides its users with products that are especially designed to allow its users to communicate with each other online. For

example, Intuit provides a “QuickBase” product that purportedly “[i]mproves collaboration with easy access to shared data,” and “helps [] teams be more efficient and productive by providing faster, easier access to important data[; letting a user] control user access more closely.”<sup>3</sup> “QuickBase’s online data sharing functionality lets [a user] quickly customize [] web-based applications so [the user’s] team can work the way it wants with the data that’s relevant to [the user’s] business. Custom reports, automated email notifications and streamlined workflows are easy to set up for online data sharing, saving time and helping [the user] get more value from [the user’s] data.”<sup>4</sup> QuickBase can also be used on mobile devices.<sup>5</sup> Users can “[q]uickly set up Ad-hoc workflow to keep team members informed, on time and on budget [and s]et reminders and notifications to trigger when an action has been taken or a status has changed.”<sup>6</sup>

15. Upon information and belief, Intuit’s products, include, without limitation, online communication systems which offer a distributed discussion group whereby the users of such systems, via a network of computing devices linked by a network, are able to communicate with one another using such computing devices. The computing devices include computers, mobile devices and cellular telephones and are capable of transmitting and receiving information.

16. The system has a central agent (e.g., Intuit server system) that can receive information from, and transmit information to, the users’ computing devices. The central agent pushes notices to selected users. The users’ computing devices are linked or networked to the Intuit central agent.

17. By way of example, to facilitate communication within a group, information communicated between users can be used to send messages either to all members of the group or

to a set of members within the group. A first user is able to input information into the first user's computing device. Intuit's system will, based upon the information provided by the first user, generate a notice to a second user and allow the second user to access information from the first user. A second user is able to input information intended for a third user into the second user's computing device. Intuit's system will, based upon the information provided by the second user, generate a notice to a third user and allow the third user to access to the information from the second user.

18. By way of another example, Intuit's system stores first and second information. For example and without limitation, Intuit's system pushes notices to group participants, (i) allowing a first group participant to access the first information, while suppressing access to the first information to a second group participant, and (ii) allowing the second group participant to access the second information, while suppressing access to the second information to the first group participant.

Without limitation, and by example only, Intuit directly infringes and continue to directly infringe at least claim 1 of the '149 Patent by making, selling, using and offering for sale at least the aforementioned online communication system. Additionally, Intuit directly infringes and continues to directly infringe at least claim 14 of the '149 Patent by

making, using, selling, and offering for sale at least the aforementioned online communication services.

21. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '149 Patent by directing and/or controlling its employees, executives, users, agents, affiliates, suppliers and customers to use the aforementioned online communication system within the United States.

22. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '149 Patent by providing a website for users and/or providing applications that are downloadable on peripheral computing devices, thus putting the aforementioned online communication system into use.

23. By using the methods claimed in the '149 Patent and by making and/or using the aforementioned online communication system, Intuit has been and is now directly infringing under 35 U.S.C. § 271 one or more claims of the '149 Patent, either literally or under the doctrine of equivalents.

24. Upon information and belief, upon knowledge of the '149 Patent (at least since the filing date of this Complaint), Intuit is contributing to the infringement of the '149 Patent by, among other things, knowingly and with intent, actively encouraging its customers, suppliers, agents, users and affiliates to make, use, sell and/or offer for sale Intuit's aforementioned online communication system and services that constitutes infringement of at least claims 1 and 14 of the '149 Patent. For example, to the extent that any claim is construed to require a system, Defendant provides components, including downloadable software applications, for use in networked systems, which facilitate online notifications and communications. Intuit knows that such products constitute a material part of the inventions of the '149 Patent, knows those products to be especially made or adapted to infringe the '149 Patent, and knows that those products are not staple articles or commodities of commerce suitable for substantial non-

infringing use. Intuit knows that by providing such components to its customers, its customers will infringe at least one claim of the '149 Patent, and Intuit knows that its customers do infringe the '149 Patent.

25. By contributing to its customers', suppliers', agents', users' and affiliates' use of the methods claimed in the '149 Patent and their making and/or using the aforementioned online communication system, Intuit has been and is now indirectly infringing under 35 U.S.C. § 271(c) one or more claims of the '149 Patent, either literally or under the doctrine of equivalents.

26. Without limitation, and by example only, Intuit directly infringes and continues to directly infringe at least claim 1 of the '229 Patent by making, selling, using and offering for sale at least the aforementioned online communication system. Additionally, Intuit directly infringes and continues to directly infringe at least claim 22 of the '229 Patent by making, using, selling, and offering for sale at least the aforementioned online communication services.

34. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '229 Patent by directing and/or controlling its employees, executives, users, agents, affiliates, suppliers and customers to use the aforementioned online communication system within the United States.

35. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '229 Patent by providing a website for users and/or providing applications that are downloadable on peripheral computing devices, thus putting the aforementioned online communication system into use.

Additionally, Intuit directly infringes and continues to directly infringe at least claim 1 of the '495 Patent by making, using, selling, and offering for sale at least the aforementioned online communication services.

47. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '495 Patent by directing and/or controlling its employees, executives, users, agents, affiliates, suppliers and customers to use the aforementioned online communication system within the United States.

48. Intuit also directly infringes one or more claims of the '495 Patent by providing a website for users and/or providing applications that are downloadable on peripheral computing devices, thus putting the aforementioned online communication system into use.

49. By using the methods claimed in the '495 Patent and by making and/or using the aforementioned online communication system, Intuit has been and is now directly infringing

one or more claims of the '495 Patent, either literally or under the doctrine of equivalents.

55. As a result of Intuit's unlawful infringement of the '495 Patent, Sampo has suffered and will continue to suffer damage. Sampo is entitled to recover from Intuit the damages adequate to compensate for such infringement, which have yet to be determined.

56. Intuit will continue to infringe the '495 Patent unless and until it is enjoined by this Court.

57. Intuit, by way of its infringing activities, has caused and continues to cause Sampo to suffer damages in an amount to be determined at trial. Sampo has no adequate remedy at law against Intuit's acts of infringement and, unless Intuit is enjoined from its infringement of the '495 Patent, Sampo will suffer irreparable harm.

#### **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

WHEREFORE, Sampo respectfully requests that this Court enter judgment in its favor as follows:

A. Holding that Defendant has directly infringed, literally and/or under the doctrine of equivalents, one or more of the claims of the Patents-in-Suit;

B. Holding that Defendant has indirectly infringed, literally and/or under the doctrine of equivalents, one or more of the claims of the Patents-in-Suit;

C. Permanently enjoining Defendant and its officers, directors, agents, servants, employees, affiliates, divisions, branches, subsidiaries, parents and all others acting in concert or privity with any of them from infringing, inducing the infringement of, or contributing to the infringement of the Patents-in-Suit;

D. Permanently enjoining the use of the online communication products created or used according to the patented methods of the Patents-in-Suit;



E. Awarding to Sampo the damages to which it is entitled under 35 U.S.C. § 284 for Defendant's past infringement and any continuing or future infringement up until the date Defendant is finally and permanently enjoined from further infringement, including compensatory damages;

F. Declaring this to be an exceptional case and awarding Sampo's attorneys' fees under 35 U.S.C. § 285;

G. Awarding Sampo costs and expenses in this action;

H. Awarding Sampo pre- and post-judgment interest on its damages; and

I. Awarding Sampo such other and further relief in law or in equity as this Court deems just and proper.

**JURY DEMAND**

Sampo, under Rule 38 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, requests a trial by jury of any and all issues so triable by right.
