COMPLAINT

For its Complaint, Plaintiff Hublink, LLC ("Hublink"), by and through the undersigned counsel, alleges as follows:

THE PARTIES

1. Hublink is a Texas limited liability company with a place of business located at 1400 Preston Road, Suite 400, Plano, Texas 75093.

2. Defendant Vidyo, Inc. is a Delaware company with, upon information and belief, a place of business located at 433 Hackensack Avenue, Hackensack, New Jersey 07601.

3. By forming its company in Delaware, Defendant has a permanent and continuous presence in Delaware.

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

4. This action arises under the Patent Act, 35 U.S.C. § 1 *et seq*.

5. Subject matter jurisdiction is proper in this Court under 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331 and 1338.

6. Upon information and belief, Defendant conducts substantial business in this forum, directly or through intermediaries, including: (i) at least a portion of the infringements alleged herein; and (ii) regularly doing or soliciting business, engaging in other persistent courses

of conduct and/or deriving substantial revenue from goods and services provided to individuals in this district.

7. Venue is proper in this district pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1400(b).

THE PATENT-IN-SUIT

8. On June 29, 2004, U.S. Patent No. 7,239,338 (the "'338 patent"), entitled "Videophone System and Method," was duly and lawfully issued by the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office. A true and correct copy of the '338 patent is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

9. The '338 patent solves problems of providing real time video conferencing.

10. The claims of the '338 patent effect an improvement in video conferencing to solve the problems of relatively high cost, complexity both in design and use, the inability to concurrently provide quality image and sound, and the inability to provide a network infrastructure capable of two-way communications with minimal signal degradation.

11. Hublink is the assignee and owner of the right, title and interest in and to the '338 patent, including the right to assert all causes of action arising under said patent and the right to any remedies for infringement of it.

<u>COUNT I – INFRINGEMENT OF U.S. PATENT NO. 7,239,338</u>

12. Hublink repeats and realleges the allegations of paragraphs 1 through 11 as if fully set forth herein.

13. Without license or authorization and in violation of 35 U.S.C. § 271(a), Defendant is liable for infringement of at least claim 12 of the '338 patent by making, using, importing, offering for sale, and/or selling a videophone communication system in the form of the VidyoCloud software platform and mobile application for placing video calls between computers and mobile devices.

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14. More specifically and upon information and belief, Defendant uses a videophone communication system in the form of the VidyoCloud mobile application platform for placing video calls between mobile devices. See Data Sheet: VidyoCloud (available at https://21fvm71z6eomz3v3luqi11am-wpengine.netdna-ssl.com/wp-content/uploads/Data-Sheets/DS-VidyoCloud.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)). Defendant's system requires mobile devices to connect over a communications media (e.g., LAN, LTE, or Wi-Fi) with sufficient bandwidth for and configured for real-time video and audio communication. See 6 Reasons to Choose Vidyo ("Reasons") (available at https://21fvm71z6eomz3v3luqi11am-wpengine.netdnassl.com/wp-content/uploads/Brochures/6reasonstochooseVidyo.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018); VidyoCloud Architecture Overview at pp. 4-5 (available at https://21fvm71z6eomz3v3luqi11amwpengine.netdna-ssl.com/wp-content/uploads/vidyocloud-architecture-whitepaper-2016.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)). Defendant's system requires the communications media to be connected to a common communications network (e.g., WAN) with sufficient bandwidth for and configured for real-time video and audio communication. See Reasons: https://www.slideshare.net/patitosimbolico/vidyo-corporate ("Vidyo Corporate") at slide 14; https://blog.vidyo.com/all-posts/vidyoreplay-enables-users-to-record-and-webcast-from-vidyoendpoints/ (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018). Defendant's system uniquely identifies each computer or mobile device and their addresses on the communication network using a name, directory listing, IP address, or other identifying information. See Datasheet: VidyoPortal at p. 1 (available at https://21fvm71z6eomz3v3luqi11am-wpengine.netdna-ssl.com/wp-content/uploads/Data-

Sheets/DS-VidyoPortal.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)); Data Sheet: VidyoWorks at p. 2(availableathttps://21fvm71z6eomz3v3luqi11am-wpengine.netdna-ssl.com/wp-content/uploads/Data-Sheets/DS-VidyoWorks.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)). Defendant stores

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at an operations center the names, directory listings, IP addresses, or other identifying information of computers and mobile devices in order to facilitate video calls between them. *See* VidyoConferencing Administrative Guide at p. 4 ("Administrative Guide") (last accessed https://support.vidyocloud.com/hc/en-

us/article_attachments/115000464953/VidyoConferencing_Admin_Guide_17.1.0-A.pdf (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)); https://support.vidyocloud.com/hc/en-us/articles/115001431473-Web-Services-User-API (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018). A first device with the VidyoCloud software mobile app accesses stored information (e.g., e.g., name, IP address, or other endpoint and/or user/member identifying information)) about a second device from a Vidyo server, which allows the first device to transmit and receive video and audio to and from the second device. *See* Security

in VidyoCloud White Paper (available at https://drive.google.com/file/d/0B83su2Fzq2SyTW9tTDNla1prYXc/view (last accessed Mar. 7, 2018)); Administrative Guide at p. 188. Defendant's system connects one user to another through the communications network and communications media and establishes a transmission of audio and video from the mobile device of one user to the mobile device of another user. *See* Vidyo Corporate at slides 13-14.

15. Hublink is entitled to recover from Defendant the damages sustained by Hublink as a result of Defendant's infringement of the '338 patent in an amount subject to proof at trial, which, by law, cannot be less than a reasonable royalty, together with interest and costs as fixed by this Court under 35 U.S.C. § 284

JURY DEMAND

Hublink hereby demands a trial by jury on all issues so triable.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, Hublink requests that this Court enter judgment against Defendant as follows:

A. An adjudication that Defendant has infringed the '338 patent;

B. An award of damages to be paid by Defendant adequate to Hublink for Defendant's past infringement of the '338 patent and any continuing or future infringement through the date such judgment is entered, including interest, costs, expenses and an accounting of all infringing acts including, but not limited to, those acts not presented at trial;

C. A declaration that this case is exceptional under 35 U.S.C. § 285, and an award of Hublink's reasonable attorneys' fees;

D. An award to Hublink of such further relief at law or in equity as the Court deems just and proper.
